What is Winter Walk?

Encourage walking and rolling to school, or outside physical activity, even in cold weather.

Plan a one day event, encourage walking all month, or complete weekly challenges.

Enter to win prizes.

Why should schools participate?

Sunshine and fresh air have health benefits year round.

Studies have shown students complete learning tasks faster and more accurately after physical activity.

Each Winter Walk activity earns the school an entry for a prize package. A whole school event earns five entries.

Flexibility to plan what works best for the school community.

Who organizes?

It varies by school, but often times a teacher, principal, or volunteer will organize Winter Walk activities.

Winter Walk **OPTIONS**





All School Event Ideas:

- Choose a day to meet at a central location and have students walk to school together.
- Encourage students to walk, bike or roll during February and use the activity tracker on page 4 to tally each trip.



Weekly Challenges:

- Weekly challenges are found on pages 7-10.
- Choose a challenge a week and have fun during a time that works best for your class. Don't have time for all 4 challenges, complete as many as you are able.
- Each challenge has a paper component and outside activity. If weather does not cooperate, have students complete just the paper component to at least get them thinking about outside activities.



You may also wish to encourage students to do one or more of the following at home.

- Shovel a driveway or sidewalk
- Go sledding or skating with family or friends
- Scavenger Hunt (see pages 5-6)

PROMOTING

Winter Walk

This will be a fun day, week, or month for **STUDENTS**. Involving them in the planning can increase participation. Some ideas for involving students in the planning:

- A small group of students could create a display for the school entrance area
- Older student could write announcements
- Safety Patrol students or a student leadership group could make a map noting crosswalks, lighted pedestrian signs, and crossing guards for families to use as they plan their route to school.



A successful event will include the help of fellow **STAFF** members. Some will help the day of the event and others will help get the message out to parents and students.

- Talk about the event(s) at a staff meeting
- If a one day event, list duties and put sign up sheet in staff lounge
- If a week or month of activities, prepare recording sheets for teachers to have available in the classroom
- Prepare a message for parents that classroom teachers can send home
- Encourage school staff to participate in the event(s)

Let's face it, **PARENTS** are the true decision makers as to how their children get to and from school each day. Remind parents the benefits of walking to school.

- When walking with their child, it is a great opportunity to teach/remind them of pedestrian safety skills.
- Students who walk or roll to school usually arrive more relaxed and prepared for the day.
- Reduced congestion makes it safer for students using active transportation.

Include Winter Walk information in school newsletters. Post Winter Walk information on school Social Media accounts.

For a one day event

E-blast a reminder the day before. Add the event to the school calendar.

When a penguin walks, their feet stay low to the ground. It looks like a penguin shuffle.


PENGUIN SHUFFLE


Be aware of ice in parking lots, sidewalks, driveways, and the playground. Shuffle like a penguin to make it safely across.
